I. CALL TO ORDER

A. Certification of Public Notice.

Mayor Gonzalez called the meeting to order and certified the public notice of the meeting as properly posted Tuesday, December 30, 2025.

B. Invocation.

Pastor Elias Garza, Calvary Christian Center Church led the invocation.

C. Pledge of Allegiance.

Mayor Gonzalez led the "Pledge of Allegiance and Texas Flag."

D. Roll Call.

Norma A. Cantu, City Secretary called the roll and noted the absence of Commissioner Gonzalez Jr. and a quorum present.

E. Mayoral recognition.

1) Proclamation - Larissa Rodriguez [†]

Mayor Gonzalez along with the City Commission presented a proclamation to the family of Larissa Rodriguez recognizing her as a beloved member of the Weslaco community, her dedicated and extensive community service, leadership in school activities, and charitable efforts.

2) Proclamation - Mayor Joe V Sanchez Book Festival

Mayor Gonzalez along with the City Commission presented a proclamation to Dr. Sylvia Sanchez Garza, daughter of Mayor Joe V. Sanchez, proclaiming February 28, 2026 as “Mayor Joe V. Sanchez Book Festival” and invited the public to attend the 5th Annual Mayor Joe V. Sánchez Book Festival on Saturday, February 28, 2026, from 1-6pm at the Chamber of Commerce an annual event to celebrate our friend and local hero.

II. PUBLIC COMMENTS

Adelita Rios Ybarra expressed the need for an emergency care facility for pets in Weslaco, particularly for after-hours care; shared personal experiences with pets in critical condition and the challenges of having to travel to McAllen, where waiting times can be excessive. She advocated for a local facility that would give pets a chance at survival during emergencies.

III. PUBLIC HEARING

Commissioner Lopez seconded by Commissioner Pedraza moved to open the public hearing. The motion carried unanimously; Mayor Gonzalez was present and voting.

A. To solicit comments on behalf of the City of Weslaco amending the boundaries of Tax Increment Reinvestment Zone No. 1 City of Weslaco.

No comments.

B. To solicit input on behalf of the City of Weslaco for an extension for 120 days regarding the moratorium of applications for duplexes, triplexes, fourplexes and multifamily residential development.

No comments.

Commissioner Pedraza seconded by Commissioner Farias moved to close the public hearing. The motion carried unanimously; Mayor Gonzalez was present and voting.

IV. REPORTS

A. Weslaco Economic Development Corporation.

Michelle Smith, Community Development and Marketing Manager for the Weslaco EDC, provided an update on current activities; invited the Commission to the upcoming Alfresco Weslaco event on January 15th, noting it was the second-to-last of the season; reported working on restructuring their Business Retention and Expansion program to better connect with local business owners and inform them about available resources; the Mid Valley International Industrial Park is now 55% sold, marking a significant milestone for the city. Upcoming projects included Costa Messa's opening and construction of the proposed Shops at Westgate and Palm Plaza ongoing.

B. Weslaco Chamber of Commerce Visitor and Event Center.

Barbara Jean Garza, CEO, provided a report highlighting December activities including the recognition ceremony for Ms. Larissa Rodriguez, Leadership Mid-Valley Agricultural Day, Weslaco Lighted Christmas parade, and the Weslaco Royal Pageant orientation. The Chamber created and donated 100 stockings to local hospitals for children and families during the holiday season. Upcoming events include a networking lunch at The Grove Farmhouse, a joint networking mixer with the cities of Mercedes and Donna, and several ribbon cuttings including a milestone ceremony for L&R Apartments celebrating 50 years in Weslaco; announced that Texas Onion Fest is scheduled for Saturday, March 28th; reported on the visitors center daily activities for the month of December.

V. CONSENT AGENDA

VI. APPOINTMENTS

A. Discussion and consideration on Resolution 2026-01 for appointments of two members to the Tax Increment Reinvestment Zone No. 1. (Staffed by City Secretary.)

Norma A. Cantu, City Secretary, stated two appointments were still needed. Randy Winston was nominated by Mayor Adrian Gonzalez and Americo Garza was nominated by Commissioner Pedraza to the Tax Increment Reinvestment Zone No. 1.

Commissioner Farias, seconded by Commissioner Lopez moved to approve Resolution 2026-01 appointing Randy Winston and Americo Garza to the Tax Increment Reinvestment Zone No. 1 as presented. The motion carried unanimously; Mayor Gonzalez was present and voting.

B. Discussion and consideration on Resolution 2026-02 appointing a member to the Parks & Recreation Advisory Board for an unexpired term. (Staffed by City Secretary.)

No action.

VII. OLD BUSINESS

A. Discussion and consideration to approve final payment of \$23,150 to Rio Roofing, Inc. for the Valley Nature Center Reroofing Project. (There was no action on December 16, 2025; staffed by Assistant City Manager.)

Omar Rodriguez, Asst. City Manager, explained that this item closes out the project with Rio Roofing, Inc. He noted that the contractor has completed all work, and the architect has certified that all submittals have been provided as per the contract. Staff recommended approval of the final payment.

Commissioner Rodriguez, seconded by Mayor Pro Tem Garcia Jr. moved to approve final payment of \$23,150 to Rio Roofing Inc. as presented. The motion carried unanimously; Mayor Gonzalez was present and voting.

VIII. NEW BUSINESS

A. Discussion and consideration to reduce 10-foot utility easement to a 5-foot utility easement located on the West property line at Pleasant View Village Subdivision Lot 21, Weslaco, Hidalgo County, Texas. (Staffed by Planning & Code Enforcement Department.)

No action.

B. Discussion and consideration on the petition, acquisition and purchase of "Class A" Municipal Water Rights from Hidalgo and Cameron Counties Irrigation District No. 9. (Staffed by Planning & Code Enforcement.)

No action.

C. Discussion and consideration after the public hearing on behalf of the City of Weslaco to approve an extension of 120 days on the temporary moratorium pertaining to recent applications for duplexes, triplexes, fourplexes and multifamily residential development. (Staffed by City Manager/Planning and Code Enforcement Department.)

Rebekah de la Fuente, Planning and Code Enforcement Director, presented an update on the moratorium established on September 23, 2024, regarding applications for triplexes, fourplexes, and apartment complexes within city limits and the ETJ and noted that the moratorium allowed for exemptions and waivers that must be submitted to the City Commission for consideration; went over various infrastructure projects, included the completed Cleckler-Heald RDF project, Pablo Pena Park improvements 55% and ongoing work on the South wastewater treatment plant expansion; reviewing water and wastewater infrastructure needs, working on the subdivision ordinance, building codes, water rights fees, zoning ordinance, and land assessment plans to prepare for implementing impact fees. Stated that a Unified Development Ordinance (UDO) is being created to replace the current zoning, sign, and subdivision ordinances. Staff is awaiting the

second draft from consultants and will then open it to departmental review with a timeline of five or six months away from completion. Staff recommended approval.

Commissioner Farias seconded by Commissioner Pedraza moved to approve the 120-day extension of the moratorium as presented. The motion carried unanimously; Mayor Gonzalez was present and voting.

D. Discussion and consideration to approve a professional engineering services agreement with Cruz Hogan Consulting Engineers for the design of the Paisano Storm Drainage Improvements Project, in an amount not to exceed \$600,000.00. (Staffed by Engineering Department.)

Peter Hermida, City Engineer, explained that this project was identified in a drainage study as a priority for improvement to the area due to ongoing flooding concerns. The proposed agreement covers survey, engineering design, preparation of construction plans, specifications, cost estimates, and bidding assistance. Staff recommended approval.

Mayor Gonzalez emphasized the importance of moving quickly on this project, noting that the area was heavily impacted by flooding in March.

Commissioner Farias seconded by Mayor Pro Tem Garcia Jr. moved to approve a professional engineering services agreement with Cruz Hogan Consulting Engineers for the design of the Paisano Storm Drainage Improvements Project, in an amount not to exceed \$600,000.00 as presented. The motion carried unanimously; Mayor Gonzalez was present and voting.

E. Discussion and consideration to approve the 2024-2025 Interlocal Agreement with the County of Hidalgo for the implementation of the Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) under Grant No. B-25-UC-48-0501 setting the City's allotment at \$279,996.00 for activities to be carried out in the City's jurisdiction. (Staffed by Engineering Department.)

Peter Hermida stated the agreement allowed Hidalgo County to administer the CDBG program on behalf of the city for the 2024-2025 program year. The city's allotment is \$279,996.00 to be used for eligible CDBG activities within the city.

In response to Commissioner Rodriguez's question, it was clarified that the funds had already been allocated to specific projects that were approved in November 2024. These projects include water line replacement on Bridge Street between Pike and Business 83, senior services for Amigos (\$5,000), and health services. It was noted that the next round of CDBG funding will be presented at the next commission meeting. Staff recommended approval.

Commissioner Pedraza, seconded by Commissioner Lopez moved to approve the 2024-2025 Interlocal Agreement with the County of Hidalgo for the implementation of the Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) under Grant No. B-25-UC-48-0501. The motion carried unanimously; Mayor Gonzalez was present and voting.

F. Discussion and consideration of purchasing police uniforms with GT Distributors for the amount of \$28,271.74 (BuyBoard Contract 698-23). (Staffed by Police Department.)

Commissioner Rodriguez and Farias abstained from discussion and voting.

Robert Lopez, Police Chief, stated this purchase is to restock the inventory of shirts and pants (uniforms) for police officers and stated that maintaining inventory allows officers to receive replacement uniforms timely. Staff recommended approval and expenditure is budgeted.

Mayor Pro Tem Garcia Jr. seconded by Commissioner Lopez moved to approve of purchasing police uniforms with GT Distributors for \$28,271.74 (BuyBoard Contract 698-23). The motion carried; Commissioners Rodriguez and Farias abstained; Mayor Gonzalez was present and voting.

G. Discussion and interview of firms and possible selection and approval for staff to negotiate a contract for RFQ No. 2025-26-10, Bond Counsel Services. (Staffed by Finance Department.)

Rosie Cavazos, Finance Director, stated two responses to the Request for Qualifications received for bond counsel services that demonstrated strong experience in Texas municipal finance. Staff evaluated and scored the firm's responses and were very close. Rosie Cavazos stated the firms of Jackson Walker LLP and Winstead PC were in attendance for presentations to the commission.

Noel Valdes, Jackson Walker LLP, highlighted his 20 years of experience representing cities including Beeville, Victoria, Harlingen, McAllen, Del Rio, and Laredo; emphasized that Weslaco would be a priority client for him as he rebuilds his practice after taking two years off. Valdes stressed his team approach and commitment to being available and present for the city.

Dan Martinez, Winstead PC, went over his role as chair of the public finance group and his experience working with the city, including on a recent bond election for drainage projects. He emphasized his approach as a team player, his accessibility, and his steady presence in the Valley; highlighted on the importance of keeping the city informed of legislative changes affecting bond issuances and his experience with economic development tools such as special districts.

After the presentations and Q&A sessions, the firms were ranked. Rosie Cavazos stated the highest-ranking firm was Winstead PC and recommended approval to negotiate with Dan Martinez, Winstead PC.

Commissioner Farias seconded by Commissioner Pedraza moved to approve staff negotiating a contract with Winstead PC for bond counsel services as presented. The motion carried unanimously; Mayor Gonzalez was present and voting.

H. Discussion and consideration on Resolution No. 2026-03 prescribing meeting days will be held on the first and third Wednesday for the months of February, March, April and May. (Staffed by Mayor.)

Mayor Gonzalez requested that the regular Commission meetings be moved from Tuesdays to Wednesdays for the months of February through May to allow him to attend his son's senior year baseball games. Discussion ensued about potential conflicts with other meetings, the scheduling of workshops and discussed regular meetings to begin at 5:00pm. Staff noted there would be no conflicts, workshops would be at 4:00pm and regular meetings could begin at 5:00pm if that was the consensus of the commission.

Commissioner Farias seconded by Commissioner Lopez moved to approve Resolution No. 2026-03 prescribing meeting days will be held on the first and third Wednesday for the months of February, March, April and May beginning at 5:00pm as presented. The motion carried unanimously; Mayor Gonzalez was present and voting.

I. Discussion and consideration to ratify Amendment 4 to the Professional Services Agreement with BSG Architects Inc for the amount of \$14,020 related to design work for the Mayor Gene Braught Theater. (Staffed by City Manager.)

Omar Rodriguez stated additional services were requested for the evaluation of the HVAC system in the Mayor Braught Theater. Staff stated the architect was authorized to move forward for their investigation of the design regarding the HVAC and will provide recommendations to staff. Staff recommended approval.

Commissioner Farias seconded by Commissioner Lopez moved to approve and ratify Amendment 4 to the Professional Services Agreement with BSG Architects Inc for \$14,020. The motion carried unanimously; Mayor Gonzalez was present and voting.

J. Discussion and consideration for Amendment 5 to the Professional Services Agreement with BSG Architects Inc related to design services of Audio-Visual Equipment for the amount of \$14,350. (Staffed by City Manager.)

Omar Rodriguez clarified that this amendment is for civil engineering and for easement documentation for an AEP transformer at the project, not for audio-visual equipment. Staff recommended approval in the amount of \$14,350.

Commissioner Rodriguez seconded by Commissioner Pedraza moved to approve Amendment 5 to the Professional Services Agreement with BSG Architects Inc. for civil engineering services. The motion carried unanimously; Mayor Gonzalez was present and voting.

K. Discussion and consideration to authorize staff to negotiate a contract for RFB No. 2025-26-11 – Various Park Improvements for the base bid amount of \$2,895,500 to the lowest responsive bidder, EB Merrit Construction of Pharr, Texas and reject alternatives

Omar Rodriguez reported that two bids were received for this project, with EB Merrit Construction of Pharr being the most responsive and responsible bidder; explained that the project included replacing restrooms and concession facilities at Mayor Pablo Pena City Park's baseball field, redoing the road from Airport to Utah, adding irrigation to Field 1, addressing backstops; went

over improvements to Isaac Rodriguez Park included closure of the east-west street, replacing the concession stand and restrooms with a single unit, creating a courtyard, and providing irrigation improvements to the multipurpose field. Staff stated the six alternates were rejected, including monument signs for both parks, pickleball court at Isacc Rodriguez Park, bleachers at Mayor Pablo Pena Park, fabric shade structures, irrigation for Field 3, and asphalt subgrade for the park road. Staff recommended approval to negotiate a contract for the Various Park Improvements with EB Merrit Construction for the base bid amount of \$2,895,500 and reject alternatives.

Mayor Pro Tem Garcia Jr. expressed interest in seeing specifications for the bathroom facilities and voiced concerns about potential issues that might arise during construction.

Commissioner Pedraza seconded by Commissioner Farias moved to negotiate a contract for the base bid amount of \$2,895,500 with EB Merrit Construction and reject all alternate bids. The motion carried unanimously; Mayor Gonzalez was present and voting.

L. Discussion and consideration to award RFB NO. 2025-26-13 for City Grounds Maintenance for various facilities to the most responsive and responsible bidder being JC3 Lawn & Landscape not to exceed \$70,900.00 from the date of approval for 1 year. (Staffed by Parks & Recreation Department.)

Eddie Serna, Parks and Recreation Director, recommended awarding lowest responsive bid to JC3 Lawn & Landscape in the amount of \$70,900. Stated the JC3 Lawn has done previous work for the city to the satisfaction of the department. The contract covers ground maintenance at various city facilities including City Hall, UTRGV-EDC, fire stations, libraries, police station, shooting range, airport, animal shelter, and other locations.

In response to the Commission, staff noted that the contract specifies bi-weekly service but can be adjusted based on weather conditions and growth patterns. Mayor Pro Tem Garcia emphasized the importance of monitoring to ensure mowing only occurs when needed, expressing concern about unnecessary mowing that creates dust.

Commissioner Pedraza seconded by Commission Lopez moved to approve JC Lawn & Landscape in the amount of \$70,900 as presented. The motion carried unanimously; Mayor Gonzalez was present and voting.

M. Discussion and consideration for renewal of the Interlocal Agreement between Hidalgo County and City of Weslaco to provide support for on-site emergency operations in response to a public health emergency. (Staffed by Fire Department.)

Antonio Lopez, Fire Chief, stated this is an annual renewal of the agreement with Hidalgo County Public Health that was established during the 2020 COVID. The agreement ensures that in the event of another public health emergency, the city and county have defined roles and responsibilities for coordinating their response. Staff recommended approval.

Commissioner Farias seconded by Commissioner Pedraza moved to approve the Interlocal Agreement between Hidalgo County and City of Weslaco to provide support for on-site emergency operations in response to a public health emergency as presented. The motion carried unanimously; Mayor Gonzalez was present and voting.

IX. EXECUTIVE SESSION

At 7:18 p.m. Commissioner Farias seconded by Commissioner Lopez moved to convene the regular meeting into Executive Session. The motion carried unanimously; Mayor Gonzalez was present and voting.

At 8:06 p.m. Mayor Gonzalez stated the City Commission had completed its Executive Session and reconvened the regular meeting as open to the public.

XI. ADJOURNMENT

Commissioner Farias seconded by Commissioner Pedraza moved to adjourn the regular meeting of January 6, 2026 at 8:07 p.m. The motion carried unanimously; Mayor Gonzalez was present and voting.
